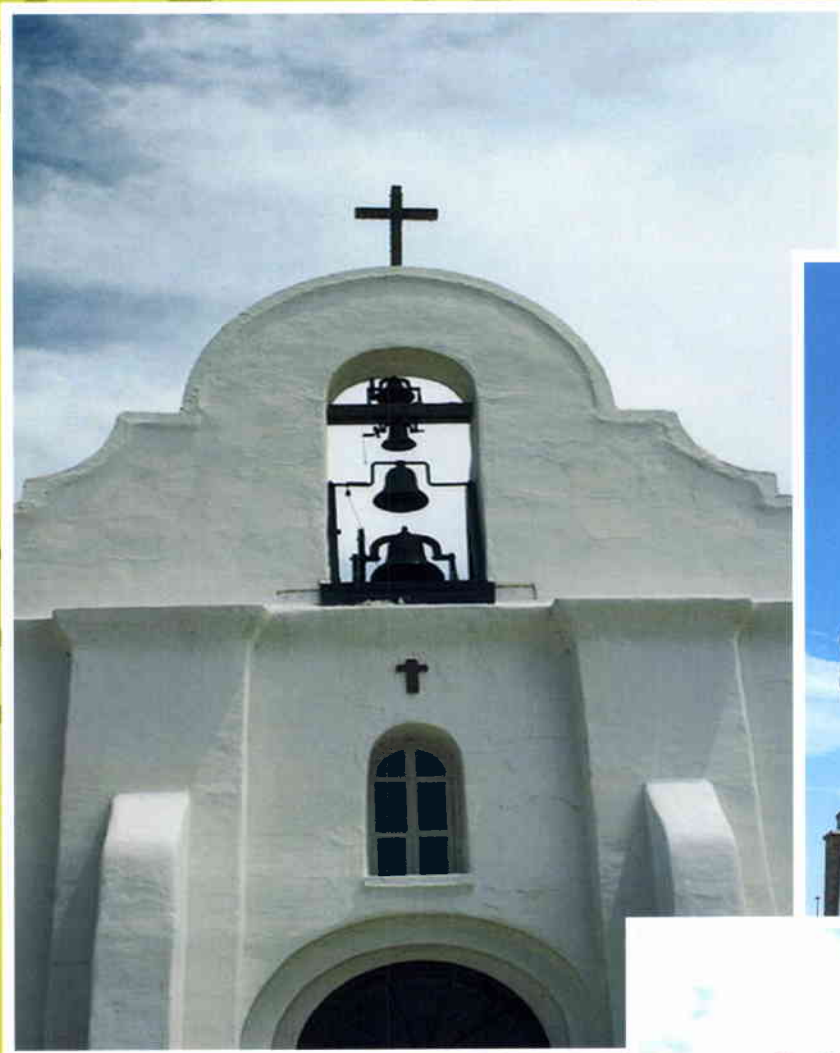


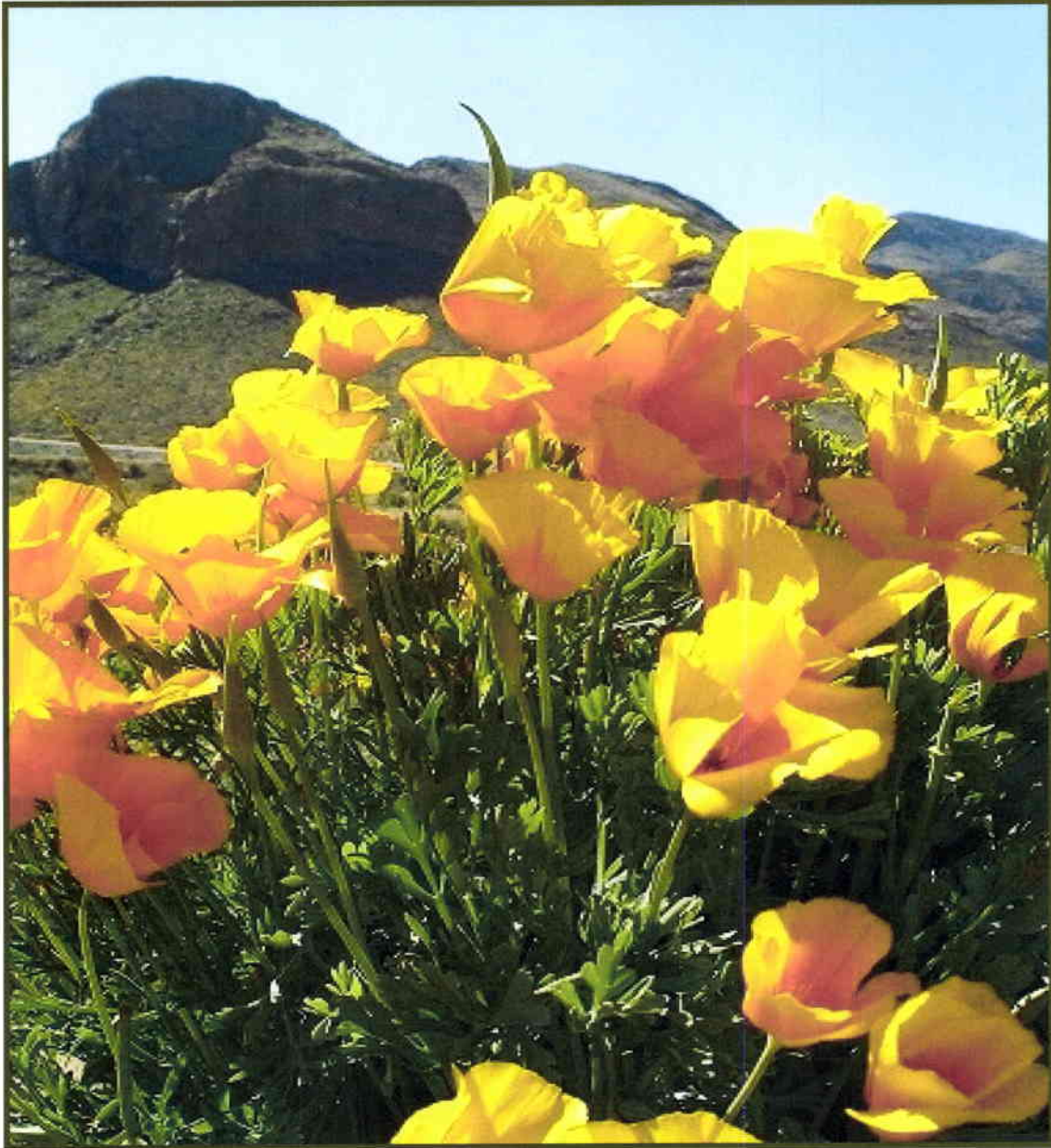

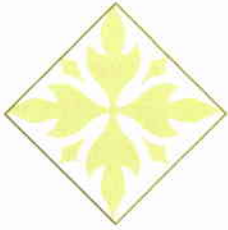


Mission Statement

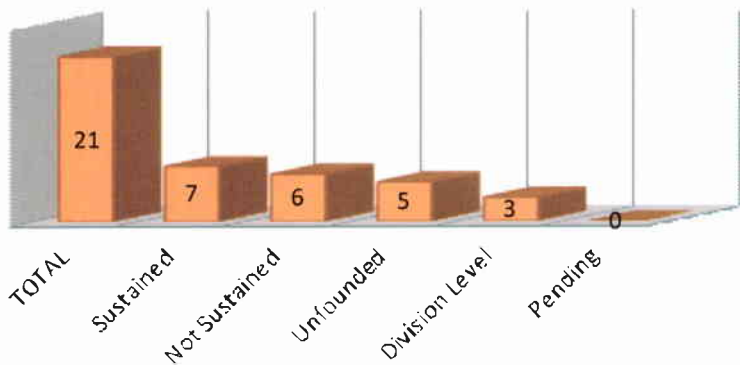


INTERNAL AFFAIRS



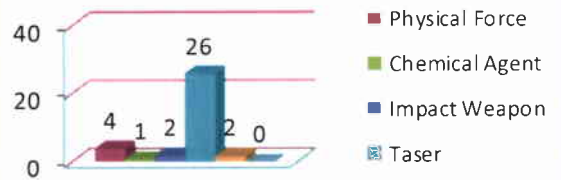

Citizen Complaints

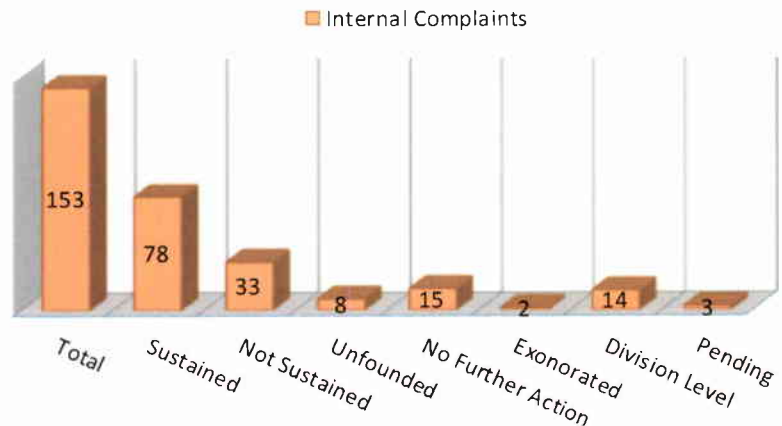

PATROL

2011 was another watershed year for the Patrol Bureau as was evident through the many milestones that were passed. Based on service demands and call volume, the Patrol Bureau has placed patrol stations and districts in strategic areas so deputies are able to provide consistent, efficient response and prevention of criminal activity. We will continue to identify areas where processes can be streamlined

and improved, while simultaneously allowing the Sheriff's Office to be more effective, proactive and responsive to our community needs. In 2011-2012, the Patrol Bureau will once again review the boundary lines between the Montana and Clint Patrol Districts in order to address the population growth, community

needs and response times to calls for service. Among the major accomplishments was the creation of an Area Traffic Officer Program (ATO) which is an avenue for citizens to express their traffic concerns to a deputy specializing exclusively in traffic related matters. Once a concern is received, the Deputy will see the matter through to resolution, thereby empowering citizens to take a more active role in their community.

Headquarters—Traffic

Headquarters is located on the east side of the County and houses the Bureau Commander, Traffic Sergeant, Traffic Enforcement and the Special Traffic Investigations Section. The Bureau Commander is responsible for all Patrol Stations, Traffic, and Courthouse Security. Each station is supervised by a Station Lieutenant, with the exception of Traffic, which is supervised by the Bureau Commander. These stations serve as the point of origin for personnel and units working the field. Each station has a designated number of districts for which it is responsible.

Montana Station

The Montana Station is located on the east side of the County. The Montana Station Lieutenant has primary responsibility for patrol districts 230, 240, 250, and 260. The area these districts encompass is from the eastern city limits of the City of El Paso to the Hudspeth County line; north to the Federal Military Reservation and south to Interstate Highway 10. The Montana Station serves an estimated population of 14,902 (2000 US Census). The Sparks sub-station located at the intersection of Sparks Drive and Peyton Road, and used by field personnel for report writing, prisoner processing and administrative tasks.

Vinton Station

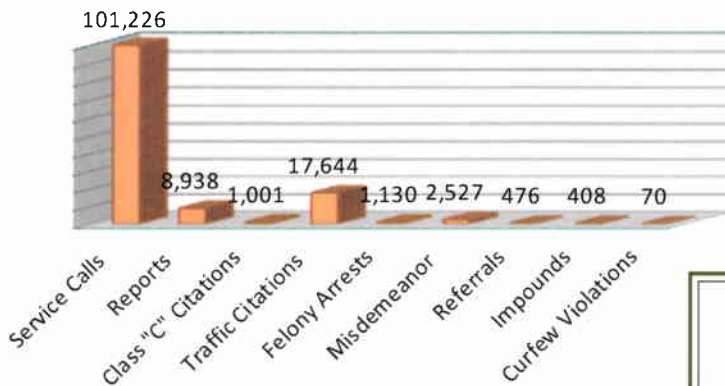
The Vinton Station, is located in the northwestern corner of the County. The Vinton station Lieutenant has the primary responsibility for patrol districts 200, 210 and 220. These districts encompass the area from the western city limits of El Paso North to the New Mexico state line; from the edge of the Franklin Mountains State Park West to the New Mexico state line The city unit is assigned to Vinton to investigate sexual assaults occurring throughout the county and many other incidents which may be reported in the city, but involve the Sheriff's Office. The Vinton Station serves an estimated population of 17,115 (2010 US Census).



Clint Station

2011 saw the procurement of unused county office space to create a fully functional Patrol Station in the Town of Clint Texas. This site is centrally located in El Paso's Lower Valley and brings much needed law enforcement services to the doorsteps of citizens residing in the Lower Valley. The addition of a Patrol Station in Clint will enhance the response times of deputies dispatched to emergency situations increasing the overall safety of residents in the Lower Valley. The Clint Station Lieutenant has the primary responsibility for patrol districts 265, 270, 280, and 290 as well as the Field Training Officer Program. The area these districts encompass is from the eastern city limits of the City of El Paso to the Hudspeth county line south of Interstate Highway 10 and north of the international border. The Clint Station serves an estimated population of 27,306 (2010 US Census).

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS

The Criminal Investigations Bureau is responsible for investigating all criminal complaints within El Paso County. There are two investigative sections in this Bureau which are dedicated to investigating all reported crimes against persons and property. These investigative sections operate with twenty one detectives and two sergeants.

This Report provides numerous statistical crime data collected, measuring the bureau's investigative productivity. The crime data collected for specific crimes may direct us to proactive measures by pre-planning tactical investigative operations, aggressive investigating and collaboration with the Patrol Bureau or the Special Operations Bureau in taking proactive measures to preventing crimes and identifying suspects that may be involved in criminal activity. In 2011 the Crimes against Persons Section received 2,753 criminal complaints.

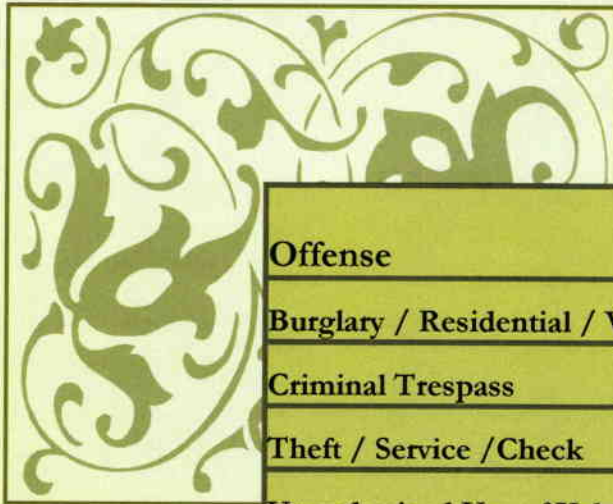

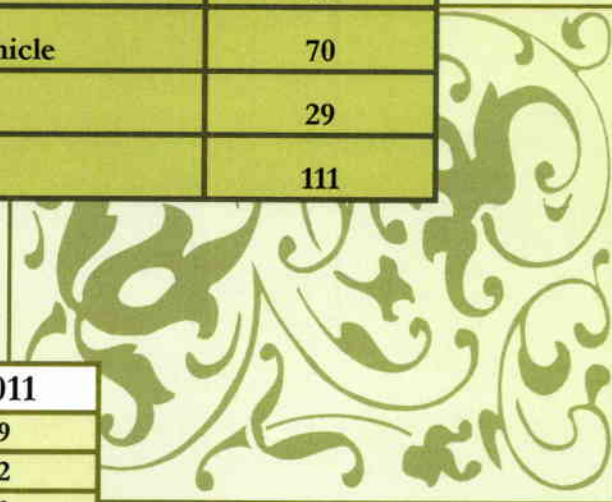

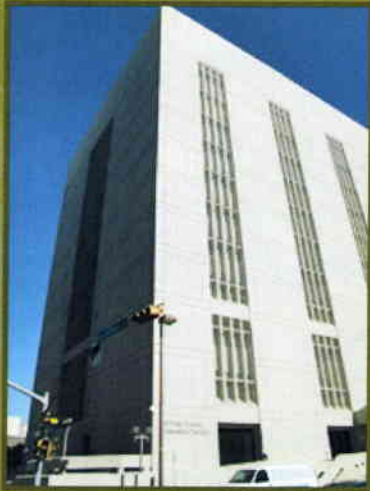

DETENTION FACILITY

The El Paso County Detention Services System, under the command of Executive Chief Deputy Sylvia Aguilar, consists of two adult maximum-security detention facilities; the Detention Facility Bureau and the Jail Annex Bureau. The operational concept for both facilities is to receive unclassified persons, house pre-trial and convicted persons, and allow for processing, classifying and releasing of persons 24 hours a day.

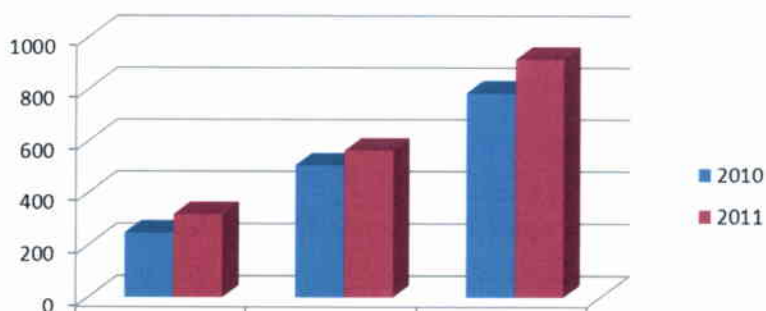
The Detention Facility, supervised by Commander Wendy Wisneski, houses both federal/state male and female inmates.

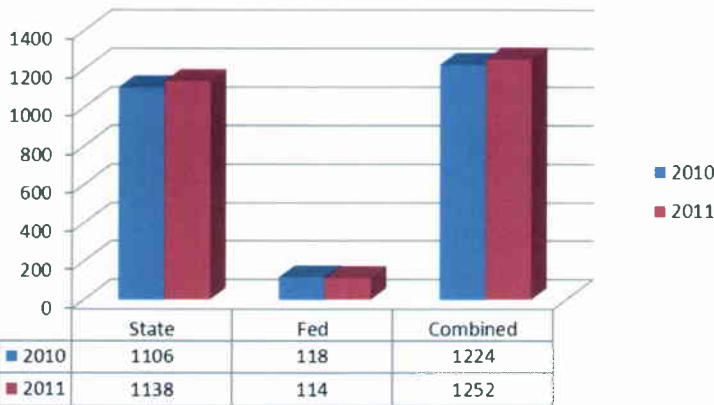
JAIL ANNEX

Located at 12501 E. Montana, the Jail Annex is a modular design comprised of three units each consisting of four pods. It has the capability of holding 1440 Inmates and has an infirmary capable of holding an additional 10 inmates. The Jail Annex receives classified persons from the Detention Facility and holds pretrial and convicted persons.

The Jail Annex, supervised by Commander Angel Colorado, houses male inmates only.

In 2011, the Jail Annex Bureau averaged approximately (1252) inmates in custody daily, in comparison to (1224) inmates in 2010. This figure includes inmates who are assigned to housing and those in custody but not yet classified.

The federal population in 2011 averaged approximately (114) inmates, compared to (1138) state inmates classified and in housing daily.

Intake/Releases of Inmates:

In 2011, there were (4,821) persons booked into the Jail Annex compared to (394) in 2010, an increase of (4427) intakes. These bookings ranged from misdemeanors to felony arrests. It must also be noted that booking at the Annex did not begin until Oct. of 2010.

REGION VIII TRAINING ACADEMY

2011 marked a period of advancing technology and preparation for major changes to the Academy's future funding sources. The major focus for the academy was to improve blended instruction using "Go Green" technology and practices, while maintaining high standards of training for both pre-service and in-service students, upgrading the facilities and preparing for the pending loss of a major funding source through a State grant. The academy went under staffing changes and continued serving as a Regional Training Academy.

BULLY FREE CAMPAIGN

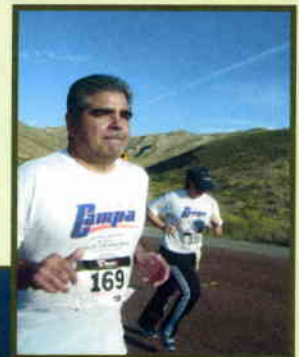

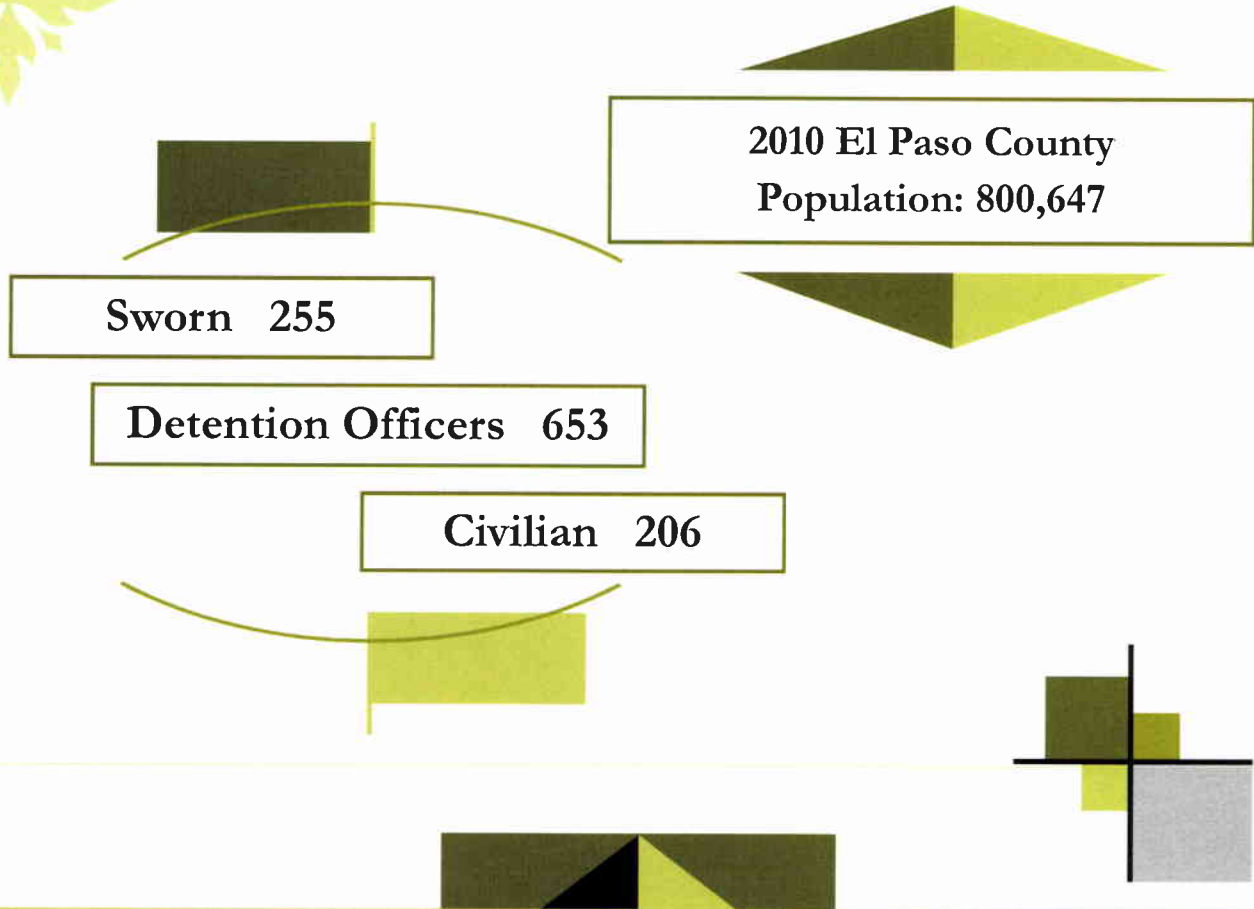
