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NEWSLETTER HIGHLIGHTS



EL PASO COUNTY BOND UPDATE

In February 2024, El Paso County initiated a series of public meetings to gather input from residents on priority projects for potential bond funding. This community-driven process led the Bond Advisory Committee to recommend a list of projects and a financing structure. On November 5th, El Paso County voters had the opportunity to decide on five propositions to fund these initiatives. The results reflect both successes and challenges, with the community approving three initiatives and disapproving two.

The following propositions were on the ballot:

- A: Parks & Recreation: \$95.6 million
- B: New Office of Medical Examiner: \$26.7 million
- C: Courthouse, Sub courthouses, and Related Annexes
- D: County Coliseum Renovation & Modernization
- E: New Animal Shelter: \$32.7 million

Propositions A, B, and E were approved by voters, while Propositions C and D did not pass. Here's a closer look at what the approved projects will accomplish:

- **Proposition A**: Includes 19 improvement projects, with five specifically for Ascarate Park, enhancing recreational spaces and amenities.
- **Proposition B**: Funds the construction of a new Office of the Medical Examiner, responsible for medicolegal death investigations, including unexpected deaths in the county.
- **Proposition E**: Establishes a new animal shelter, improving access to services such as shelters for stray animals, vaccinations, spay and neuter programs, and community training.


While Propositions C and D did not pass, Commissioner Stout remains committed to finding alternative funding sources to address these important initiatives. Proposition C included plans for the Corbin-Sambrano Wellness Center (more info on next page), while Proposition D proposed the renovation and modernization of the County Coliseum, and failed by about 700 votes of about 223,000 votes cast (less than .5 percent of the vote).

Financial Impact

The approved \$155 million bond is estimated to cost taxpayers approximately \$29 per year, or \$2.42 per month, for a home valued at \$200,000. The County Coliseum: Looking Ahead

Despite the failure of Proposition D, the El Paso County Coliseum continues to serve as a vibrant venue for concerts, sporting events, markets, and conventions. Commissioner Stout is exploring alternative funding options to ensure the coliseum reaches its full potential. As part of ongoing improvements, a new marquee will be installed in the coming months to draw greater attention to the venue. The El Paso Sports Commission is actively seeking sponsorships to fund the marquee, aiming to minimize or eliminate costs to the county and taxpayers through private funding.

ASCARATE LAKE

Although funding for the project to improve Ascarate Lake was not part of the bond package, it is a project the County has been working on to make further improvements to the park. El Paso County staff are expected to come to Commissioners Court in the near future to provide improvement options.



TEXAS CHAPTER 59

The property intended for the Corbin Sambrano Wellness Center operated as a sexually-oriented business and was seized by the District Attorney's office in 2014 after 10 years of litigation because of illegal activity. El Paso County District Attorney Jaime Esparza then donated the property to the County under Chapter 59 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, which requires the following uses:

- 1. Mental health, drug, or rehabilitation service, or
- 2. Services for victims or witnesses of criminal offenses or instances of abuse, or
- 3. The provision of training or education related to the first two.

CORBIN SAMBRANO WELLNESS CENTER

Commissioner Stout has been at the forefront of efforts to transform the former Valley Theater, once an adultoriented establishment, into a hub for healing and community services. After being seized by the El Paso District Attorney, the property was handed over to the County in 2020 with the requirement that its future use comply with Chapter 59 regulations (mentioned above).

The Corbin Sambrano and San Juan neighborhood associations have collaborated closely with El Paso County to develop plans that reflect community input and priorities. The proposed designs feature sustainable construction methods, energy-efficient air-conditioning, and landscaping with native plants from the Chihuahuan Desert. This multi-purpose facility will provide space for diverse programs and events, ensuring it serves a broad range of community needs. Although Proposition C, which included funding for the Corbin Sambrano Wellness Center, did not pass in the November 2024 election, progress continues. Existing funds secured by the County will facilitate the demolition phase, expected to be completed within four to eight months. Environmental analysis and design development are already underway to align the project with community needs. Commissioner Stout is dedicated to maintaining transparency and actively engaging the community throughout the project's development. Regular updates and opportunities for public input will ensure that this initiative reflects the collective vision of those it serves.





BRIDGE OF THE AMERICAS PORT MODERNIZATION PROJECT



On September 20, 2024, the Environmental Impact Statement was released by the U.S General Services Administration (GSA) with the recommendation that the port be modernized for passenger and pedestrian traffic only. While it was originally open for a 45-day comment period, it was extended to be open until December 2nd, 2024. Once the final EIS is published, a minimum 30-day waiting period will be put in place, prior to a decision being announced in a Record of Decision.

Commercial transportation is not only having an effect on the neighborhoods surrounding BOTA, but also on the residents crossing. Nonetheless, Commissioner Stout remains committed to public health and removing trucks from BOTA. The primary purpose of the BOTA modernization project is to create a smoother transition when crossing the border. The GSA recommendation allows the opportunity to reconfigure the regional approach using three other ports of entry, all of which are growing in volume as commercial activity slows at the BOTA POE; it provides new commercial opportunities, promotes the local economy of people who work, shop, and socialize on both sides of the border, and above all, incorporates public health into regional ports management.



89TH LEGISLATIVE SESSION

The Texas State Legislature is set to convene on January 12th, 2025 for the 89th Regular Legislative Session. The Legislature meets every two years for 140 days. This is the only time the Legislature can pass the budget and bills that are signed into law. Because of the fast-paced environment and limited time in session, only a small portion of the bills filed become law. Below, you can find how a bill becomes law, some statistics on how many bills make it through the process and dates of interest for next session. The Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, who acts as Texas' chief tax collector, accountant, revenue estimator, treasurer and purchasing manager, reported there will be an estimated \$20 billion surplus for the next biennium 2025-2026. We expect to see the legislators appropriate these moneys to additional property tax relief. Although we would hope the Legislature would fully fund public schools with these funds, state leadership has expressed interest in appropriating moneys for school vouchers, a government-funded certificate that allows parents to use public money to pay for their child's tuition at a private school of their choice. There might also be further investing on Operation Lone Star and similar measures.



On another note, El Paso County staff has worked diligently to put together our legislative agenda, which consists of a number bill ideas to improve the level of service we provide to our community, as well as several value statements that represent what El Paso supports and opposes in a variety of issues ranging from land use, to justice and public safety, to community and economic development. 89TH SESSION - DATES OF INTEREST

Tuesday, November 12, 2024: legislators start prefiling bills. A record number of 1,511 bills were filed in the House and Senate.

Tuesday, January 14, 2025: First day of session - 89th Legislature convenes at noon

Friday, March 14, 2025: 60th day of session – last day to file bills

Monday, June 2, 2025: Sine die – last day of 89th Regular Session

BILL STATISTICS

88th Regular Session 11,807 bills filed 4,500 passed 77 vetoed

87th Regular Session 9,999 bills filed 3,803 passed 21 vetoed <u>86th Regular Session</u> 10,877 bills filed 4,581 passed 58 vetoed

85th Regular Session 10,672 bills filed 4,960 passed 51 vetoed Policy priorities championed by Commissioner Stout that have recently been approved or are in process include:

- Applying \$6 million in ARPA funds for re-entry services to reduce recidivism; by working with local non-profits for re-entry services the County is able to apply this reform at a lower cost than if the County built its own facility, which was estimated to cost \$17 million.
- Approving \$\$2,257,150 and \$3,934,000 with Spectrum and AT&T respectively, in ARPA funds for broadband service in areas of the County that do not have service, or have slow unreliable service; we learned during Covid that for everyone -from students to small business owners- to access, reliable, fast Internet services is a basic need.
- Developing an Arts Commission, Arts Master Plan, and community projects in each Commissioners' precinct; this is expected to be approved in December.


LIGHTS ON THE LAKE
